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About this report

PRI reporting is the largest global reporting project on responsible investment. It was developed with investors, for investors.

PRI signatories are required to report publicly on their responsible investment activities each year. In turn, they receive a number of outputs, including a public and private Transparency Report.

The public Transparency Reports, which are produced using signatories' reported information, provide accountability and support signatories to have internal discussions about their practices and to discuss these with their clients, beneficiaries, and other stakeholders.

This public Transparency Report is an export of the signatory's responses to the PRI Reporting Framework during the 2024 reporting period. It includes the signatory's responses to core indicators, as well as responses to plus indicators that the signatory has agreed to make public.

In response to signatory feedback, the PRI has not summarised signatories' responses – the information in this document is presented exactly as it was reported.

For each of the indicators in this document, all options selected by the signatory are presented, including links and qualitative responses. In some indicators, all applicable options are included for additional context.

Section 1. Our commitment

Why does your organisation engage in responsible investment?

• What is your organisation's overall approach to responsible investment, and what major responsible investment commitment(s) have you made?

We have the fiduciary duty to act in the best interests of our clients, which is why we integrate ESG factors into our investment, development, and asset management process. Beyond our fiduciary duty, we have the responsibility and opportunity to influence numerous environmental and social aspects through our investment and asset management approach. The real estate industry is known for its emissions intensity and impact on communities and individuals, and therefore we believe it is our responsibility to analyse, consider, and act on ESG risks, opportunities, and impacts as a core part of the work that we do.

We look at Responsible Investment through four pillars: value creation, risk mitigation, positive contribution and investor alignment. In other words, our Responsible Investment strategy encompasses ESG integration and asset level improvements, stewardship and advocacy, ESG upskilling, reporting and regulatory compliance, as well as aligning with investors ESG needs (e.g., specific exclusion guidelines). We have set commitments on Net Zero Carbon as well as asset specific sustainability action plans and targets for our development projects that contain more detailed commitments. We will continue to define our commitments as projects advance, the regulatory environment evolves, and new technologies emerge.

We consider climate change related physical and transition risks, and mitigation opportunities the most material considerations to our organisation. This is predominantly due to regulatory requirements, stakeholder expectations, market sentiment, and the link between financial performance and impact. During the reporting year, we have looked at addressing this topic through various workstreams: (1) Skills and education - whereby our employees are provided with training to learn how climate related factors may be relevant for their role, and therefore empowering them to consider these in their day-to-day activities. This looks different for e.g., the Investment team versus the Development team; (2) Investment process - all potential investments are evaluated for their physical climate risk exposure and energy efficiency performance among other factors before the investment decision is made; (3) Asset Management - all assets are implementing sustainability action plans as part of the business plans, which includes improvements to reduce the energy intensity and emissions of the asset, while we are in the ongoing process of setting Net Zero targets, but have not yet done so for all assets; (4) Development - Whole Life Carbon assessments are carried out for refurbishment and development projects, and the recommendations are considered and actioned where practicable and achievable to minimise emissions to reduce embodied carbon; (5) Corporate Footprint - we have measured our corporate Scope 1, 2, and 3 emissions and are now working on creating a reduction strategy; (6) Industry Collaboration - we signed up to the British Property Federation's Net Zero Carbon pledge and are collaborating with other industry organisations such as BusinessLDN, Kings College London, Real Estate Balance, and the Diversity Project.

During the reporting period we have consolidated our Responsible Investment processes, added guidelines, and refreshed existing internal procedures.

There is a clearer approach to RI across our Funds and throughout the firm, which allows us to improve how we communicate it externally to our stakeholders.

The year saw progress on energy performance with reduced exposure to energy inefficient assets with EPC ratings below C and improved consumption data coverage, which provided greater insight into performance at both asset and Fund level. Our DEI Committee also worked to strengthen our DEI related strategy, with emphasis on the cultural elements of working with inclusion and respect, as well as expanding the mental and physical health support offered to staff. Our collaborative engagements were focused on decarbonisation (e.g., our 'Buildings as Material Banks' project together with Kings College London), and community engagement and inclusivity (e.g., collaborating with the Academy of Real Assets and engaging with KCL, local authorities, and charities to re-frame how community needs can be better solved for in the built environment).

There was a particular focus on Biodiversity during the year with a number of presentations and training sessions with staff, project teams and clients, as well as progress made with planning consents gaining experience in Biodiversity Net Gain considerations. We were also pleased to achieve 4/5 stars on all modules reported on in our first PRI disclosures last year.

Section 3. Next steps

What specific steps has your organisation outlined to advance your commitment to responsible investment in the next two years?

In the next two years, as part of an ongoing project, we continue to focus on further defining and reporting on our progress towards Net Zero goals. Through improved data collection of Scope 1, 2 and 3 emissions, and data automation (where possible), more accurate emissions reduction targets and interventions are being set for all assets. We understand the value of a robust data collection and measurement function to both inform and demonstrate the impacts of the identified decarbonisation initiatives. Consequently our efforts continue to be targeted to that outcome.

During the reporting period we compiled our first corporate sustainability report with reference to GRI standards and TCFD disclosures to further improve the transparency around our Net Zero commitment, disclosing climate-related risks and overall sustainability performance. We expect the structure and detail of this reporting to evolve over time as more data becomes available and as reporting frameworks advance.

We continue to drive collaboration across operational businesses in the fund and engage with key actors and industry groups to further strengthen the performance on sustainability in the UK real estate industry. Our framework around social value is yet to formalise across our funds, albeit we are progressing the creation of a clearer approach to capturing social KPIs and reporting on impacts more consistently. We are keeping informed of industry discussions on creating standardisation in the reporting of social value impacts.

Elaborate:

We believe Environmental, Social, and Governance factors can pose material risks and opportunities for real estate investments. This is due to ever increasing market and stakeholder expectations, regulations, and exposure to exogenous ESG risks and opportunities, and applies both at asset and fund level. Our policy explains that we integrate ESG information into our investment, development and asset management processes because we have the fiduciary duty to be responsible stewards on behalf of our clients and joint venture partners. We also look at ESG through the lens of contributing positively to the communities in which we invest and seek to find value for stakeholders through creating lasting ESG improvements at asset level (e.g., purchasing assets with poor ESG profiles with the intention of improving them).

As a real estate investor and asset manager, stewardship looks very different in practice compared to corporate based securities. Stewardship is a natural part of the asset management and development process where assets are actively improved through the active management and implementation of sustainability action plans. 'Collaborative' efforts on stewardship are done through engaging with tenants, on-site teams, local authorities, charities, lawyers, and industry groups among others.

Delancey carries out investment advisory and investment management activities in private markets and real estate assets specifically, focusing on the UK market.

Whilst not being a direct signatory to the UK Stewardship Code at present, we support the Code's objectives and many of the principles are relevant for how we are responsible owners of the assets on behalf of our clients.

Stewardship in the form of voting is not relevant for us given our investment strategy. Nevertheless, our Responsible Investment strategy outlines our approach to being a responsible developer, manager, and investor, and we engage with our stakeholders to influence risk management, value creation, and positive environmental and social outcomes. We also seek to actively engage with the wider investment community, academia, industry groups and peers on topics that are in the best interests of our stakeholders.

Specifically, immediate transition/regulatory risk as requirements become more stringent and local planning authorities expect clear approaches to address embodied and operational carbon; investment underperformance if issues are not priced in correctly from the onset; physical climate risk already having an impact on assets through extreme weather events becoming more common; internal climate illiteracy resulting in proper assessments not being implemented throughout asset lifecycle. On the opportunity side, there is a clear pathway to generating more value from improving the footprint and sustainability performance of assets. For climate-related opportunities within our planning horizon, we have a specific focus on energy efficiency and reducing emissions, as we believe this will make the assets more attractive overall while reducing our footprint.

We see opportunities beyond our standard planning horizon from the active implementation of climate prop tech and nature-based solutions, and how the overall economy will shift towards assets with less emissions intensive profiles. Those who are innovative and quick to respond to the shift in the markets are likely to see the highest growth in the long run, while failure to prepare can be costly both from a reputational and performance stand point.

It affects the entire asset lifecycle and investment strategy structures. Physical climate related risks are a significant risk area that needs to be properly assessed for all assets, irrespective of type. Similarly, from a transition risk point of view, engagement with local authorities about planning requirements is increasingly hinging on how climate related risks and opportunities have been taken into account in the design. We also see it in our investment strategies where we are increasingly investing in assets that we can improve from a climate-impact point of view and therefore drive value and occupancy while also contributing positively to the decarbonisation of the economy. There is increasing investor demand for investment products that address these risks and capitalise on the opportunities in an innovative way. For financial planning it is affecting our internal resourcing and budgets through increasingly complex climate risk assessments, reporting, and skills requirements.

Delancey has assessed the physical climate risk exposure to the UK's most prevalent and widely considered physical climate hazards (i.e. Flood, Temperature Rise, Water Stress, and Wildfire) for the majority of AUM. This was completed by using the Representative Concentration Pathways (RCP), specifically RCP8.5. Delancey was advised by a third party ESG consultant that this approach was suitable as an initial assessment and was 1) aligned with current market practices and 2) considered the likely scenario as we are currently tracking on the RCP8.5 path with an expected average global temperature rise in the range of 1.4 to 2.6 degrees Celsius by 2065 and a range of around +3.0°C temperature rise by the end of the century. It is considered important to understand the worst case scenario to fully appreciate the downside risk. In the previous reporting period, where potential climate risks were flagged as severe, we undertook an in-depth assessment, not only conducting scenario analysis for the asset, but also its surrounding community and roads servicing the asset. We are looking to expand the scenario analysis to include additional scenarios.

CRREM 1.5 Degree Celsius Pathway analysis is now automatically undertaken for the majority of AUM through our SIERA software. The CRREM model is only a step in strategy, where Net Zero Audits continue to identify areas how the asset can be brought in line with the 1.5 Pathway.

Historically, we have front loaded the assessment of physical risks during the acquisition due diligence instructing building condition surveys, flood risk assessments, geo-environmental and geo-technical assessments to assess the assets' exposure to physical risks. Now, we are also undertaking CRREM analysis to evaluate the transition risk exposure in more depth in order to help prioritise asset level actions, undertaking Net Zero Carbon Audits, and setting Sustainability Action Plans accordingly. We will do CRREM analysis pre-investment if we have 12 months of energy consumption data, otherwise and in the vast majority of cases, this happens post investment. We also measure the emissions associated with the assets, having prioritised collecting Scope 1 and 2 emissions data since 2021, and now also measuring Scope 3. The combination of assessing physical climate risk exposure, climate transition risk exposure, and actual emissions profile of the assets helps build a clearer and more complete picture of the risk exposure. This is done by our internal teams with support from specialist consultants.

(2) Describe how this process is integrated into your overall risk management

Risks identified during acquisition are highlighted to our property managers and site teams to ensure awareness, and that there is focus on ensuring management actions mitigate risks as far as possible during normal operations. Consideration of further mitigation over the mid to longer terms is included in the business plan and pursued by the asset management team. During the reporting period, we updated our internal corporate Risk Register to formally include the management of both physical and transition related risks, increasing the visibility of these risks within the business.

(1) Describe your process

If high physical climate risk exposure or inefficiencies from an emissions/energy point of view are identified this may affect the investment decision since it may alter the overall cost/return assumptions of the investment. High or medium risk exposure also may will result in interventions through Sustainability Action Plans to make the asset either more efficient (e.g., addressing poor insulation, installing renewable energy solutions, replacing gas boilers, etc) or more resilient (e.g. installation of attenuation or shading solutions). For development and refurbishment assets, these actions would be picked up in the Sustainable Development Briefs for the asset which are implemented by our Development team and relevant external project team members.

(2) Describe how this process is integrated into your overall risk management

Either Sustainability Action Plans and/or Sustainable Development Briefs are implemented post acquisition. These documents form part of annual business plans which are reviewed through out the year. During the reporting period, we updated our internal corporate Risk Register to formally include the management of both physical and transition related risks, increasing the visibility of these risks within the business.

Similarly, our Compliance team runs checks of third parties as part of the onboarding process and attestations on an annual basis to seek confirmation about anti-money laundering practices, anti-corruption and bribery. We also undertook work to formalise our Exclusions Guidelines, which now include considerations of controversial weapons, business ethics and human rights infringements. Specific client mandates may have additional themes that are excluded. For our major development projects, we held community workshops and engagement studies to ensure that the needs of local people was mapped out and included as part of the design of projects. One great example of this is the Public Realm Inclusivity Panel at Earls Court Development Company.

(A) Process one

Whilst we do not have formal negative (exclusionary) screens in place for our Funds, some of our clients have Exclusions Criteria that we apply and adhere to for their investments. However during the year we have provided guidelines for all funds under management to strengthen our process and the considerations raised need to be evaluated within the investment lifecycle and before accepting new contractual agreements. The chief considerations capture controversial sector and business involvement which amongst others includes exposure to fossil fuels, controversial weapons and human rights.

(B) Process two

A review of heating and cooling engineering operations at one asset identified plant operating at a sub-optimal run time schedule and that some pumps/motors were not operating as designed in an automatic manner. Consequently, all pumps, motors and air handling units were independently assessed, and time schedules implemented to align with core operating business hours across the estate. Additionally, an outside air temperature seasonal set point strategy was instigated for both heating and cooling operations. Further upgrades were implemented to the building management system (BMS), facilitating greater controls and integration of systems for it to become a more connected/smart building. Further a LED lighting replacement programme was initiated, with 360 out of 1,124 fittings replaced in 2023, and the remaining fittings scheduled to be completed by September 2024. The changes to the plant and the LED replacement initiative led to substantial changes in the consumption of heating and cooling and a modest reduction in electricity in 2023.

Each asset is required to have an action plan in place. This varies in practice due to the varying nature of the assets. Whilst varying sectors and asset types are all exposed to similar sustainability risks and opportunities, their materiality and their priority varies, and therefore the action plans take into account their operational and asset-specific characteristics. The action plan can take the form of a sustainable refurbishment or development brief. Monitoring of plans for investment assets takes place each quarter with more detailed updates in the formalising of annual business plans and target setting. The refurbishment or development brief is structured around review after each of the RIBA Work stages. Post practical completion, the asset then would have a Sustainability Action Plan created.

In 2023, we developed a social strategy for a London development project which was informed and supported by active engagement and consultation in the local community. Assisted by social value consultants, our teams commenced stakeholder mapping and conducted a community listening exercise to identify and analyse local needs in relation to social value. The project team used the findings of the listening exercise and the public consultations conducted in 2023 and in 2024 to inform the strategy.

The stakeholder engagement exercises, alongside engagement with key Council officers and assessment of the London Borough of Islington's (LBI) objectives, led to the team identifying existing and future priorities and the creation of a flexible framework which now forms part of the asset's initial Social Value Plan.



The Plan will focus on opportunities during construction, then through the types of facilities within the design (primarily via the affordable workspace), in the creation and curation of the facilities, and through financial contributions.

Key deliverables planned include a Schools Engagement programme, a 'nutty scientists' project and use of site hoarding for a community initiative – most likely a schools project. We are committing to work with Leading Inclusive Futures through Technology (LIFT), a programme that aims to help residents into local jobs in the knowledge economy (tech, digital, sciences, and creative production), and to support businesses and start-ups within these sectors.

The initiative has ensured that local social value aspects were included in the design process and included in the planning application. Positive feedback was received from LBI prior to the planning application submission, with the Council regarding our approach to be best practice. Aspects of our approach are informing LBI's framework to be included in the updated Local Plan.
