As Here East continues to embrace breakthrough technologies, our sixth Impact Report reflects on the past 12 months and on our role in the ongoing transformation of East London as a home for world-changing innovations.

The last year has been a chance to reflect on what 'making an impact' really means for Here East, whether in our local community, across London more widely, throughout the country, or around the world.

Today, we are not just a campus, but part of a wider historic community and innovation district on the Olympic Park. It is a collaborative ecosystem that includes not only the incredible businesses that start and scale at Here East but also partners across the park and East Bank, including the London College of Fashion, V&A East, University College London (UCL) East, Sadler's Wells East, and BBC Music Studios.

As a collective, we have a shared responsibility to make East London an economic success. Here East is central to that, having contributed £700 million of

GVA towards GDP by 2021. It is a figure that continues to increase today as we expand our global reach, with 6,500 people now working or studying across the campus. But ours is not only a story of economic growth. It is a story of transformative academic research, new businesses starting and scaling, and international companies choosing this part of the capital to invest and grow in. Being a driver of that activity across the Olympic Park is incredibly exciting and a true testament to the global reach that we have built and the international impact we continue to have.

To position ourselves for the future, however, we need to continue to push boundaries in new areas – not least by continuing to embrace the opportunities of emerging technologies, such as Al and the metaverse. Our 'Future Talks' series has explored their potential global impact on our society, the future of cities, the entertainment industry, and much more, certifying Here East's reputation as a thought leader on how the world is changing.

That reputation is supported by our growing partnerships with the Capital Factory in Austin, Texas, Ann Arbor Spark in Michigan, the International Association of Science Parks and Areas of Innovation, and dynamic activations during South By South West (SXSW). We are particularly excited that this globally renowned event will come to London next year, offering a fantastic opportunity to make yet more transatlantic connections and showcase what our capital has to offer on the world stage.

We believe this city is the best in the world to do business in. It's why we work very closely with London & Partners and the Department for Business & Trade to ensure that Here East is a landing place for global companies who are looking at London and the UK as a market they want to enter.

Creating these connections is a key reason that global businesses, like Sega and Ford, base themselves at Here East. As a result, even the small businesses that are here have an international footprint.

Take Hawk London, provider of anamorphic lenses and high-end cameras. Last year, it opened a 10,000-square foot studio at Here East as the first outpost of Hawk's UK business. Today, it is a core service provider of state-of-the-art cinematography equipment to this country's film and television industry.

Here East is also home to Sir Wayne McGregor CBE, and his internationally renowned dance studio. Sir Wayne received a knighthood in the King's Birthday Honours List this year for his pioneering contribution to dance. Through progressive innovations in performance, he has radically redefined the art in the modern era, and we are proud to have Studio Wayne McGregor as such a longstanding partner. Sir Wayne's dancers and creatives take their performances all around the world, while at Here East, we house three dance studios, including two of the largest in London – opening up a world of opportunities to creatives in East London and beyond.

Another key example is the Global Innovation Disability Hub, which was a collaboration between

ourselves, Plexal, UCL and the London Legacy Development Corporation. Having started from Plexal, it is now based out of UCL East and is a global phenomenon in the development of assistive technology for people with disabilities. The World Health Organisation recognises it as a pioneer in its field, having received more than £40 million of investment from the UK government.

We also see inspiring community-led work from organisations based in Plexal, such as My Life My Say, which campaigns for democracy as a leading driver of youth engagement, and our charity partner Badu Sports, which provides opportunities and raises attainment through mentoring and participation in sport. This work matters not only on a local level but also as an exemplar for the global businesses that come to Here East. It is hoped that they can be inspired to engage with our neighbourhoods and take that learning back home.

As we continue to deliver impact in collaboration with our many partners, I hope we can also continue to act as a global inspiration. With the Paris Olympics this year, it is especially important that we demonstrate the positive success story of Here East, which the International Olympic Committee has showcased as the most successful reuse of a Broadcast and Press Centre in the modern Olympics.

Now, we get approached from around the world, with organisations asking us to talk with them about what we have done and how we have done it and help them deliver a reuse and regeneration programme on such a scale.

While Here East's impact and influence on a global scale continue to increase, local community engagement remains at the very heart of what we do. Over the past 12 months, we have continued to develop the offering for our schools programme, with more than 500 students from local schools coming to Here East in 2023/24 – something that has never happened before on such a scale.

Importantly, we have strengthened our relationship with both Hackney Council and Newham Council, who partner with us to recruit local people into vacancies across campus. That was a vision that we wanted to achieve as part of the Olympic legacy and one that we feel has been a success.

The unique nature of Here East's educational and employment offering – both directly with us, or indirectly with our tenants – means that we create a cycle of opportunity for our community. It allows us to have touchpoints with the community from school, through university, to employment. Just look at Olivia Eastwood-Gray, the Loughborough University London alumna spotlighted in this report.

Together, we will be focusing on families and increasing the provision of youth services, to try and help more young people into further or higher education."

We are very excited that recently, we confirmed Badu Sports as our official charity partner. It reaffirms our deep commitment to social responsibility and our desire to make a tangible difference to people's lives. Through this collaboration, we can improve our support to the borough of Hackney, which has one of the highest rates of child poverty in London.

Together, we will be focusing on families and increasing the provision of youth services to try and help more young people get into further or higher education. We will look to implement joint initiatives tackling inactivity resulting from a lack of sporting opportunities that exist within these communities. This is not just about health but giving young people an outlet and a safe space. Badu's work over many years demonstrates a direct link between exercise and a reduction in crime, as well as unemployment.

While we have worked closely with Badu Sports over many years, this new partnership formalises our relationship and commits us to achieving set objectives, so that we can deliver a more tangible impact.

We have also been continuing to work with Hackney Council on developing our Diversity in Tech commission, which has been ongoing for three years now. As part of London Tech Week 2024, we ran an event, 'Power to Create Your Own Pathway', which focused on driving awareness among local residents of the courses and jobs available at Here East's universities and our tenants, respectively.

Of course, the impact of Here East is not only about what we do; it is about the amazing work of our tenants' and partners. Plexal and Sports Interactive, for example, have wonderful internships and apprenticeship programmes that are leading to more

opportunities for young people. Meanwhile, Ford conducts summer boot camps for local schools, giving those students the opportunity to meet with their team members to understand the roles available with one of the world's biggest companies.

Studio Wayne McGregor this year is also delivering its Resident 6 programme – a fellowship that brings six local artists into the space to work on their projects. It is a perfect example of what Here East offers the community: local space and resources for local creatives.

All of this work is a part of our commitment to breaking down barriers and opening up opportunities to those who may not otherwise have had them. As such, we are continuing to recruit new students for the Here East scholarship programme, which is going into its fourth year in 2024/25. It is particularly exciting that two of the students from our very first cohort of scholars are graduating this summer.

I have loved watching these amazing students – as well as the scholars that have followed in their footsteps since – develop not only academically but also as people. We feel a duty to ensure that they not only experience the breadth of opportunity available to them at Here East but that they are best prepared to enter the workplace. Through insights sessions and mentoring, we make sure they are equipped with soft skills that will help them in the future, such as communication, confidence, and team building.

Through programmes like these, we can help to bridge the skills gap in our communities, benefiting both local employers and the wider economy.

Tenant Spotlight

Loughborough University London is a postgraduateonly campus based at Here East focusing on multidisciplinary research and education in areas from Al and sport to creative industries and technologies. These both connect to, and complement, our provision in the East Midlands.

Our programmes in London have key common strengths across areas such as digital skills, technology, media, and entrepreneurship. As the Vice-Chancellor of a leading UK university, and as an Al researcher for my entire professional career, I want to make sure that Loughborough is at the forefront of innovation and future-focused developments. Loughborough's forward-looking approach, which

puts the latest research and developments at the heart of our offering, is what makes Here East a perfect partner. Our curriculum connects to the Here East campus and wider Olympic Park.

There is no better example of this than our Collaborative programme, which takes real-world organisational problems from local startups like Beryl Bikes, multinationals like Ford, and charities like Red January, enabling students from multiple disciplines to collaborate and provide innovative solutions to these problems.

This and many other activities give our students access to a burgeoning ecosystem of opportunities that prepare them for their future careers.



I believe it is our role as a university to develop positive and purposeful relationships that make a difference to the world, — whether that is in the East Midlands or East London, nationally, or on the international stage — so that our impact is felt around the world and we can create better futures, together."

In turn, this allows us to deliver on a significant aim within our university strategy, which I know is also central to Here East's mission: meaningful partnerships. Loughborough believes in creating better futures together. Central to this is the belief that we will always achieve more when we work in partnership, and this speaks to how we collaborate with industry; with businesses large and small; with government; with charities; and with a range of other stakeholders, including other universities.

For example, the creation of the Global Disability Innovation Hub – a now £80m organisation – has enabled us to work collaboratively with UCL, government, tech businesses, and disability rights organisations to drive activity across the globe that improves the lives of people with disabilities.

Specifically, our researchers were part of enabling the broadcast of the Tokyo Paralympics across 49 Sub-Sahara African countries for the first time. This partnership, and the positive impact it has created, would not have been achieved without our base within Here East.

Innovation runs through Loughborough's veins, and a focus on fostering entrepreneurship and brave innovation is central to our approaches to both innovation and research and learning and teaching. To this end, we recently launched Midlands Mindforge with seven other research-intensive universities in the Midlands region. Mindforge aims to accelerate the commercialisation of university spinouts and IP-rich businesses in the Midlands, transforming groundbreaking science and technology into successful businesses with real-world impact.

This focus on positive impact is critical for Loughborough. Earlier this year, we launched a campaign to underscore our position as a bold, ambitious university that uses its strengths and purposeful partnerships to make change for a better world. The campaign is called 'The World Can't Wait', and it underlines the pressing need for us to address the issues that face us all, now and in the future.

Universities are incredibly important to the UK. We have a profile and stellar reputation around the world, as well as a significant economic impact, contributing 750,000 jobs and £130 billion to the UK economy. It is therefore important that, at a time when the sector has been under fire, we are on the front foot in talking about how universities like Loughborough

make a positive contribution to society. Loughborough has always been a university that cares about impact. We want our research to get out there, beyond scholarly publication, to change people's lives and be used to improve society and the planet. That is why our partnerships matter: because they allow us to turn much of the research happening at the university into innovations with scalable potential.

It is perhaps unsurprising that, as the world's best university for sports-related subjects, sporting partnerships are also very important for us. Loughborough has been working with Adidas for around 20 years on everything from testing the design of footballs for the World Cup and European Championships to foot and leisure wear with innovative designs that keep athletes cool. In London, we are building on this work by investigating the impact of social media on athletes, hand in hand with tech startups like Signify.

The partnerships and initiatives highlighted here are just some examples of where our approach to partnership, coupled with world-leading research and innovation, is delivering significant positive impact. I believe it is our role as a university to develop positive and purposeful relationships that make a difference to the world – whether that is in the East Midlands or East London, nationally, or on the international stage – so that our impact is felt around the world and we can create better futures, together.

When I come back to Here East, I always try to make the most of the experience and of what's on offer. I encourage current Loughborough students to do the same as there are so many great brands and businesses based here and nearby. Thus, it is really important to unlock the time to connect with other students, lecturers, and industry experts.

My time at Loughborough also provided the spark for my new career with the NFL, where I now work in commercial partnerships, specifically looking at new business across the UK and Germany. I'm hopeful this will broaden as we continue to grow our sport internationally. The global reputation and connections of both the university and Here East helped open the door to multiple opportunities.

For Here East to continue inspiring people and making an impact, I think it's important to celebrate the stories of the people who pass through it every day and the pipeline of talent it creates from the local community, to its universities, to the amazing businesses based there – and the opportunities that this provides far beyond the campus.



Sports Interactive:



Sports Interactive (SI) is best known for producing the iconic *Football Manager* series. Celebrating its 30th anniversary this year, it is at the forefront of bringing new talent into the gaming industry.

"We have our own in-house games engine that has been built up over the entire history of making Football Manager," explains Jamie Stewart, Developer Advocate at Sports Interactive. "Some of the code files go back to the 90s! And we have an experienced team that knows the ins and outs of that base. But as an annually released title, we need to make sure we are regularly bringing in new talent so that knowledge is passed on."

SI's year-long internship programme is designed to ensure that students are schooled in the company's programming language. "Many of the major games studios, including us, use C++, which isn't what they are likely to learn at university," Jamie says. "So, what we do is feed that knowledge back into their courses, which will be incredibly useful for when they are applying for future roles."

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Two things really stick out to me. Firstly, providing feedback to some of the university students on their business development pitches. Secondly, Here East's Merry Making event out in The Yard at Christmas time. I got to speak to many different people from around the campus and learn more about what they do."

Nathanael Hondi is one of SI's 2023/24 interns working as a junior software engineer in the gameplay team. He explains the key skills he's learned through the internship: "As well as a senior developer who has acted as my mentor, I was introduced to the entire team in week one, who have always been willing to help, review my code, and give feedback on my work. I can now take the initiative and fix bugs on my own. That gives me really helpful transferable skills for my future career, whether at SI, another games studio, or as an independent developer."

Jamie emphasises that learning is simply part of the internship experience. "We can teach people to code; we don't expect our interns to know everything. What we're looking for in our applicants is communication skills."

While it is most important that interns pick up skills from SI's more senior engineers, the knowledge exchange goes both ways. "Because our team members have spent their careers on C++, when it came to using another programming language, another of our interns, Harvey, was able to step in and help," Jamie says. "Suddenly, some of our most senior staff were coming to him for advice and feedback."

Harvey Palmer's eye for detail made him an ideal candidate to work in the rule groups team at SI, programming the vastly complex and varied formats of the world's football leagues and competitions. This led to the opportunity to work on one of *Football Manager's* new licences for its most recent release, the Japanese 'J League'. "It was really fun to do something so forward facing. I was proud that I was trusted with the responsibility of a new licence for the game," Harvey says.

The cycle of feedback means that interns like Harvey and Nathanael can get closely involved in supporting the company's wider outreach, such as its relationship with East London Arts and Music (ELAM), a college in one of the key growth boroughs close to Here East. SI works closely with ELAM's games design students on CV and portfolio reviews, and an end-of-year showcase. From there, the studio takes in one student each year as a summer intern for six weeks.

Just a few years ago, Nathanael was a student at ELAM himself, being mentored by one of SI's previous junior software engineers. This led him to secure a summer internship. Today, he takes on that same role for ELAM's current students.

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SI and its interns also support students at the universities based at Here East, particularly Staffordshire University London and Loughborough University London. The team provides mentoring, mock interviews, and feedback on pitching. "That's been one of the main benefits of working at Sports Interactive and being based at Here East," says Nathanael. "We have a lot of interaction with different companies, and I had the opportunity to organise and give feedback on mock interviews to some of Loughborough's students."

Harvey also made the most of the Here East experience. Remembering his highlights of the year, he says: "Two things really stick out to me. Firstly, providing feedback to some of the university students on their business development pitches. Secondly, Here East's Merry Making event out in The Yard at Christmas time. I got to speak to many different people from around the campus and learn more about what they do."


Supporting young talent is a core mission for both Sports Interactive and Here East. The two organisations will continue working together to bring students from East London onto the campus.

Panda Surgical: Shaping the future of surgery through robotics



Panda Surgical is a spin out from University College London (UCL) that harnesses the power of next generation robotics and AI to make neurosurgery safer and more effective. It was born from a research project by co-founders Professor Danail Stoyanov, Dr Hani Marcus, and Dr Manios Dimitrakakis and is now based in UCL's research facilities at Here East.

With its state-of-the-art technology, Panda Surgical has developed the first ever handheld robotic device for minimally invasive neurosurgery, aiming to reduce the risks and boost adoption of these vital procedures.

"When neurosurgeons want to remove tumours and other abnormalities from deep within the skull and spine in a safe manner, they have to manipulate tissue through very long, narrow corridors using channels such as the nose, the eyes, or tiny artificial holes on the patient's head or back. Although

keyhole neurosurgery is less dangerous than open neurosurgery, it can still be challenging for surgeons to navigate the restricted space and manipulate the tumour effectively with currently available instruments," explains Manios, Panda Surgical's CEO.

"This tool can allow surgeons to improve more quickly, as they can reach more tumours," adds the spin out's Senior Robotics Engineer, Dr George Dwyer.

With enhanced dexterity and control, the devices allow surgeons to penetrate deep pockets, confined spaces, and previously unreachable places in the human body to remove tumours effectively and safely. When coupled with the company's AI platform, these cutting-edge tools empower surgeons to perform delicate manoeuvres and remove higher quantities of tumours with less risks and more precision.

Currently at the preclinical stage, Panda Surgical has not tested its instruments on live patients yet.





However, having now secured seed investment, and after having conducted extensive evaluations of human cadavers and simulations, Manios hopes to be able to complete the company's first human trial within the next year or so: "Because our solution is inexpensive and very easy to learn, we think it can be seamlessly incorporated into the operative theatre. This will mean more surgeons will have the ability to perform these intricately complex surgeries, resulting in more patients having improved outcomes and access to these procedures."

Being part of Here East's innovation ecosystem has been invaluable for Panda Surgical, helping the company forge vital industry connections and fuel its business and technical development – especially in terms of finding quick advice on technical matters from other businesses on campus.

"Generally, when you want to have a chat with people, they're more than happy to talk things through and tell you their opinion on things," says George.

"Collaborating in the wider Here East environment has been great for us," adds Manios. "We are a tiny startup, so every interaction we're able to have with more experienced experts or people who have done this before is very important for us.

"It also helps that we're located in a very vibrant area of London, which makes it very easy to entice partners, investors, and talent to come to us."

Panda Surgical hopes to attract these investors to ensure that its innovative solution can be scaled: "We think our technology can have a massive global impact because the problems we are tackling are present all around the world."

Aiming to improve endoscopic neurosurgery on a global scale, Panda's team of five is set to grow very soon, which will assist in accelerating development and conduct the first in-human clinical trial as soon as possible. Following this, the startup will look to target different markets around the world and obtain regulatory approval.

"Our next major steps are clinical trials," says George, "we want to be developing this instrument and getting it into patients as quickly as possible to try and improve surgery."

"After that, we hope we will be able to obtain regulatory approval in order to place systems in hospitals around the world," says Manios. "We want to try and help as many people as we can."




Plexal's partnership approach

Plexal continued to scale throughout 2023 and the first half of 2024. We now employ 92 people across seven locations and work with 26 different clients. That's a 50% growth in terms of people and customers in the last 12 months alone.

Those clients vary from small startups to some of the largest organisations in the world, including Google, Airbus, and the UK government.

We act as an innovation consultancy to the government, and our offering is something that I consider to be unique. We are first and foremost, a physical space. That means we are a place where innovation happens, surrounded by the energy and dynamism of incredible private sector startups. This gives us the credibility to make an impact on the science and technology policy agenda and support government-led innovation.

We then take inspiration for everything that has been created at Plexal and Here East to build innovation clusters around the country. This can affect even more policy areas, beyond science and technology, from supporting the national redistribution of wealth and increasing productivity across the country, to increasing international trade and securing supply chains.

By working closely with the civil service to help deliver on its priorities, sharing in its mission, and ensuring we do not favour any one party, we have become a trusted partner to government. As a result, we have created the permission structures and the access to influence the public sector, as well as the private sector organisations that support them, creating a value exchange between public and private, academia and investors, companies large and small. Beyond providing support for our clients, we remain a close partner to our ever-growing membership at Plexal – organisations of all shapes and sizes.

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From My Life My Say, which is focused on driving youth participation in politics, to Canopy, a spinout division of Ford Motor Company releasing products for vehicle security, to name just two.

Witnessing the journey of these growing companies with rich ideas and agile development pathways, where innovation happens really quickly is something that makes me extremely proud. But what excites me the most is seeing the sparks of new ideas among our members and watching these turn into successful products.


For Safetech, that partnership validates its position in the UK market and gives the company a baseline from which to grow, ultimately leading to a greater investment in people and facilities. While CarbonQuota's day to day is focused on powering a net zero mission, it must also think about the structure and longevity of its business, to which cybersecurity is absolutely vital, particularly when it comes to securing its customers' supply chains.

Partnerships like these, alongside our continued growth, helps us reflect on how far Plexal has come since the 2012 Olympic Games and the initial inspiration Gavin and I had to put this innovation ecosystem at the heart of Here East. It is a fantastic case study of collaboration and clustering that we are now seeing organisations around the world looking to replicate. It's up to us to help them to do it using the model and method we've created here.



Future Vision

This report aims to provide a sense of the extent to which Here East is helping to shape the future – both at home and around the world. This campus was set up to nurture talent and innovation, and that is exactly what we continue to do today. 


